September Program

TJ Johnston, N4UYQ, presented an enjoyable and informative PSK31 demonstration. PSK31 is based on an idea by SP9VRC and developed by Peter Martinez, G3PLX. It uses Phase Shift Keying with a baudrate of 31.25, resulting in a very narrow bandwidth of 31 Hz. This allows a dozen or so contacts all within a one kHz band pass. Plus this mode reduces both QRN and QRM. By downloading a program and connecting the sound card LINE IN to your HF transceiver external speaker port, we can tune to 14073.00 LSB and watch the waterfall screen for vertical, yellow, scrolling PSK31 signals

The 11th International Amateur Radio Union Region III Conference ended Sept. 1 by proposing the elimination of the Morse code requirement for Amateur licenses. While they agreed Morse code is an effective mode of transmission, they also agreed that the requirement for it is detrimental for the advancement of the radio art.

My opinion, like others, is only a dime a dozen in value...but I support the decision of the proposal. I am not knocking code. Please read the whole article before forming an opinion of my opinion.

Instead of teaching a bunch of hams to sit around talking at such a slow rate of speed, let's stress more the digital side of the art of Amateur Radio. Let's stress more the "hands- on" experience in the classroom of setting up a good quality digital

packet station as well as a good clean operating voice station. Let's teach them the art of choosing the most user-friendly packet software, how to install it, and get on the air.

After teaching the latest state of art station installation and operation, then let's promote Morse code as a "lost art" mode of emergency communication. NO, Morse code is not a lost art...yet. But with the reduction of the requirement, it soon will be, except for the older hams who will be willing to start "ole timers clubs" within clubs for continuing Morse code for the new ham who wants to learn it if he gets his ticket mainly for the use of emergency communications.

I am not the only one who fits this type of a schedule, but this is a basic run down of my daily activities. I get up at 5:00 AM, on call by 6:00 AM. I get a short rest period sometime around 10:30 to find shade somewhere to cut a couple of ZZZs in the car. 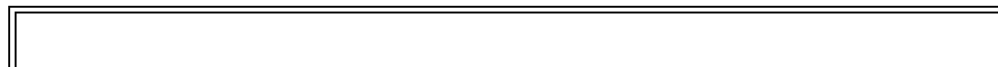

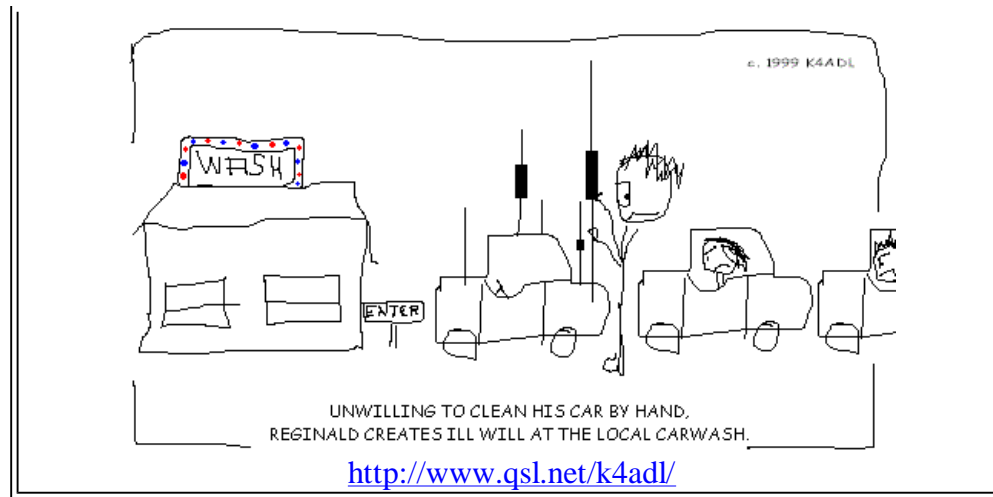
