## Self-policing

Nobody likes a snitch—nobody who is snitched upon, at least. “Narc, snitch, stool pigeon.” All those names conjure up stereotypes that are derogatory. But consider this: The issuance of federal credentials (your radio license) comes with the expectation that we will all be policemen of sorts. Every time I have heard Riley Hollingsworth speak, he talks of amateur radio being “self-policing.” What does that mean?

All of us have committed an occasional act of omission that has put us at odds with Part 97. Whether it was forgetting to ID at a ten-minute interval, or being a Kc or two out of band, our mental lapses as human beings could have potentially gotten us a personal letter from Riley on an occasion or two. I even saw one letter he sent regarding excessive ignition noise accompanying the carrier of a mobile operator’s transmission!

One thing I learned early on was that real amateur radio operators take pride in technical accomplishments and in strict adherence to the ground rules. If that is not enough, the Amateur Enforcement Bureau expects us to go a step further and follow “good amateur practice!” What does this mean for us?

First, this means that hams are accountable to one another for proper operation if we are to ensure the integrity and future of ham radio. Whether it is the phone call, email, or “You’re out of the window, old man,” transmission on the air, we must remember that self-policing is a staple of the amateur radio service.

If I take my radio license seriously, “good amateur practice” requires that I become an Elmer, Elmer, and policeman, all at the same time. As an Elmer, I must be willing to teach what I know, regardless of how short a time I may have been licensed.

As an Elmer, I must be open to correction. Even though I may have been licensed for years, it may not mean that I am well versed in every aspect of the hobby or not apt to ever err. If I am to be a true ham, always seeking to increase my knowledge and abilities, I need to be open to input to many sources.

Granted, there is a distinct difference between a single act of omission and intentional or repeated acts. In the event of the former, maybe the phone call or reminder is all that is needed. I remember one time I had my daughter calling DX spots to me from the

cluster. We actually had a good rhythm going, until I realized that the last spot she called had put me out of band for my privileges. I could have gotten reamed out on the air. I could have been reported to Riley. As it happened, neither occurred and I have been most careful since then.

## VE EXAMS

Exams for licensing or upgrading for the next three months are as follows. There are two locations, one in Chester and the other in Richmond. To take an exam you must bring \$10.00 cash (exact change) and two forms of ID, one of which must be a photo ID. If you are upgrading, you must bring the original of your current license *and* a photocopy of it.

If you have credit for previously passed element(s) bring your original CSCE *and* a photocopy of it. Arrive 15 minutes early. Preregistration is preferred, but not required (unless you are taking the CW element in Chester, then required). Walk-ins are welcome if seating and materials are available.


